

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

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No matter where you turn, growth and change are on people's minds – everywhere from media headlines to conversations between neighbors and friends. If you look through the next few pages of this report, these topics will present themselves in information about the cases heard by the Planning Commission, development highlights from the previous year, and highlights of the work our agency has led. The presence of these issues in our everyday lives, and our staff's everyday work, is the reason we have been undertaking so much long-range planning work over the past few years and are embarking on more in the year ahead.

Our staff worked alongside Knox County during the creation of the unincorporated county's first ever integrated Comprehensive Land Use and Transportation Plan and we are pleased to report that it was successfully adopted this spring. This multi-year process helped set the stage for the county to address continued growth and development in an intentional way. We are now eager to begin work on the next phase in the process, the creation of a Unified Development Ordinance, which will be guided by the goals and vision of the Comprehensive Plan.

We are equally excited about long-range planning work we have embarked on in partnership with the City of Knoxville and the surrounding region. In partnership with Knoxville Area Transit, we have begun work to identify areas where transit service and future development can align along corridors in the city. We are also continuing work with the city that started this past year on Breathe, a project involving outreach to the Knoxville Metro Area to identify factors that will help advance our region's goals related to the environment and greenhouse gas reductions. Another regional endeavor is the process being undertaken by the TPO to update our region's long-range transportation plan, Mobility Plan 2050.

Our agency is committed to collaborating with local partners to engage in forward thinking planning processes to inform ongoing dialogue and decisions about important issues and opportunities. We recognize the importance of working with the communities we serve to create shared visions for the future to guide our work. Please read on to learn more about what we have accomplished on this front over the past year.



PLANNING COMMISSIONERS

The planning commission is an advisory board made up of 15 citizens seven appointed by the City Mayor and eight by the County Mayor.

These volunteers come from a variety of backgrounds, representing diverse community interests and concerns. They serve staggered four-year terms and may be re-appointed. The Commission meets the second Thursday of every month.

Executive Committee: On an annual basis, the Planning Commission Chair appoints an Executive Committee consisting of the Chair, Vice-Chair, and three other members of the Commission. Terms are one year in length.

The Executive Committee reviews and recommends the annual budget and work program, consults and advises on matters brought by the Executive Director, and resolves staff issues as needed.





PLANNING SERVICES

Planning Services staff guide residents, developers, and others through local review processes. Planners evaluate requests for rezonings, subdivisions, and development plans, and they prepare a recommendation for each case that will be considered by the Planning Commission.

The group updates long-range land use plans and conducts special studies, like park inventories, small area plans, and guidelines for neighborhood overlays. Staff also maintain the county's property addressing system. Planning Services works closely with several city and county departments, as well as our own Transportation Planning division, promoting the interconnectivity of land use and transportation infrastructure.

ADDRESSING AND PLATS

Addressing

Planning's Addressing Department makes sure that each residence and place of business in Knox County is systematically assigned a valid, unique address, complete with a structure number and road name, essential for the community's safety and for proper service delivery.

Subdivision Plat Review

Planning is responsible for regulating the subdivision of all land in Knox County other than the Town of Farragut. Final plats are reviewed and certified by staff. Plats requiring a variance from the subdivision regulations, or those that create 26 or more lots, require approval by the Planning Commission prior to certification.

Missing Middle

Planning and city staff collaborated to craft Middle Housing standards that were adopted by the Planning Commission and City Council earlier this year. Middle Housing types are now permitted in certain residential zoning districts within the Traditional Neighborhood Residential area, and Planning staff is reviewing these applications. These changes were informed by the Middle Housing Scan that was released in the fall of 2022.

Advance Knox

Work on the Comprehensive Land Use and Transportation Plan, an outcome of the Advance Knox process, concluded this year. In early 2024, the Comprehensive Plan and the Future Land Use Map were both adopted and are now in effect. Additionally, an amendment was made to the Growth Policy Plan. The Advance Knox planning process will continue as Knox County and Planning partner on the creation of a new Unified Development Ordinance (UDO), which is expected to begin later this year.





TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

The Transportation Planning group supports the Knoxville Regional Transportation Planning Organization, or TPO. This federally-required entity coordinates road improvements, bicycle and pedestrian plans, freight movement, and transit.

Staff members collaborate with the Planning Services division on corridor studies, long-range plans, and other land use planning activities, in addition to working closely with the engineering departments and transportation service providers of Knoxville, Knox County, and several surrounding communities.

Mobility Plan 2050

TPO staff began updating the long-range transportation plan known as Mobility Plan 2050. This plan will examine the current state of transportation in and around the Knoxville region and make recommendations for future investments. The first round of public engagement concluded in February of this year, and the next round is scheduled for the fall.

Federal Certification Review

The TPO successfully completed the federal certification review of the metropolitan transportation planning and programming process. Staff received commendations for their organizational structure, performance-based planning and programming, and transportation improvement program development and management.



INFORMATION SERVICES

This division comprises several support functions, including research, GIS, web development, graphic design, and communications. Staff assist agency-wide planning activities by conducting background research for plans and presentations, maintaining the print and digital library, and leading community outreach efforts.

Planning's geographic information systems (GIS) group maintains land and infrastructure data systems and produces maps. Web and design staff are responsible for content management and presentation of the many websites housed at Planning, and they prepare artwork and layouts for the agency's plans, reports, and brochures.

Website Support

Staff from our Information Services division continue to lend expertise to local partners by providing content, design, and programming support for their websites. The team plays an important role in website support for the Knoxville Chamber, Industrial Development Board, Knoxville Regional Transportation Planning Organization, and projects like Advance Knox and Breathe.

Breathe Project

The City of Knoxville and Planning are partnering on a Climate Pollution Reduction Grant for the Knoxville metro area. Information Services staff worked collaboratively to develop a brand, website, and an outreach program for this project. Our agency is now working with an outreach consultant to engage with communities within the metro area to complete a Comprehensive Climate Action Plan.

Knoxville's Housing Strategy

Planning staff collaborated with the City of Knoxville to provide research and data management in support of the creation of the city's new housing strategy. The strategy identifies challenges unique to Knoxville, accompanied by plans to utilize tools to support the development of new housing in the coming years. Information Services staff also assisted this project through the creation of a custom-built interactive dashboard and story map.

Our agency also seeks out unique engagement opportunities to share our work with the communities we serve. Each year we participate in events like Park(ing) Day and Open Streets where we interact with the public in creative ways to help translate our work into relatable activities and games. We also look for opportunities to work with younger audiences to inform them about what planning is and how it impacts their communities.

Our staff participated in a summer program led by the Appalachian Regional Commission and Oak Ridge Associated Universities. These organizations facilitated two cohorts of middle school students from Appalachia in week-long summer camps where students learned about AI, 3D printing and city planning. Our staff presented information to them and led them through an interactive exercise to design a site based on what they had learned.

We partnered with a group of engineering students from West High School in which we presented them with a project prompt focused on transportation planning, engineering, and Complete Streets design. Our staff worked with engineering staff from the City of Knoxville to share a presentation, talk about their prompt, and lead them on walking tours of downtown.

We worked with students from the University of Tennessee School of Architecture who tested the City of Knoxville's Middle Housing proposal. Students gave presentations of their work, including models and drawings, and later shared their ideas with the public at a First Friday exhibit in Emory Place.



BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

Design Review Board

The Design Review Board examines proposals for private and public development in Knoxville's center city. The group also reviews applications for infill housing in Edgewood, Lonsdale, and Oakwood/Lincoln Park neighborhoods for conformance with the Heart of Knoxville Infill Housing Guidelines. The goal of the review board is to foster attractive and harmonious development and rehabilitation of the downtown area and to ensure infill development is architecturally compatible with established neighborhoods, fosters community stability, creates pedestrian-oriented streets, and meets a wide range of housing needs.

Historic Zoning Commissions

The Historic Zoning Commissions for Knoxville and Knox County evaluate projects proposed in local Historic Overlay districts. Work of the commissions is intended to stabilize or improve property values by encouraging rehabilitation and new construction that is harmonious with the area. The commissions review applications to repair, alter, rehabilitate, relocate, or demolish properties; review proposed new construction; and identify properties for local or National Register of Historic Places designation.



Tennessee Technology Corridor Development Authority (TTCDA)

The Tennessee Technology Corridor Development Authority and its design guidelines ensure aesthetic quality and environmental conservation for developments within the Technology Overlay zones of the city and county.

TPO Executive Board and Technical Committee

The TPO Executive Board and Technical Committee work with TPO staff to make decisions on regional transportation plans and projects. The Executive Board, which sets policy and adopts plans, is made up of elected officials from the TPO planning area, representatives from the East Tennessee Development District, and the Governor of Tennessee. The Technical Committee consists of local planners and engineers who work closely with staff and make recommendations to the Executive Board.
