
ECONOMIC ANALYSIS: 2005-2015 Comparisons between the Tennessee Technology Corridor Development Authority (TTCDA) area and Knox County




Jobs by Worker Educational Attainment Knox County v. Technology Corridor

> In 2015, almost 6% more of the workers in the **Technology** Corridor have achieved a bachelor's degree or higher than workers in Knox County, reflecting the higher level of education required by the dominant technology and scientific based industries within the corridor.





In a 10-year period from 2005 to 2015, jobs in the Technology Corridor have been higher wage earning jobs than the rest of Knox County. By 2015, almost 60% of the jobs in the Technology Corridor earned more than \$3,333 per month, while in Knox County the same wage-earning jobs were approximately 20% less than in the corridor.



According to U.S. business economy data for jobs by industry sector in 2015, using the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS), the top five industries in Knox County are Health Care and Social Assistance; Retail Trade; Educational Services; Accommodation and Food Services; and Administration and Support for Waste Management and Remediation. However, in the Technology Corridor the top five industries are Administration and Support for Waste Management and Remediation; Manufacturing; Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services; Educational Services; and Wholesale Trade, which is reflective of economic development efforts in the corridor.
